

2013 was an extremely successful year for Ohio Iota. This past year we were fortunate enough to be awarded a Golden Buchanan Cup, our 6th Buchanan Cup in a row, only one of eight Golden Buchanan Cups awarded in the nation. The Trifecta consists of Academics, Campus and Community Involvement, and Sports. This past year we held a 3.34 GPA as a chapter, had over 138 community service hours per member, and won intramural championships in dodgeball, soccer, volleyball, tennis and more. Along with these chapter awards we had five members tapped into Blue Key National Honor Society, recognizing the top 13 leaders on campus. We also had seven members selected for Mortar Board National Honor Society. Currently, there are over fifteen student organizations on campus where a SigEp is serving as president. Our very own Joshua Beekman was awarded Greek Man of the Year, the second year in a row that it has been awarded to a SigEp. Josh was also selected as a Regional Director for SigEp Nationals. Along with winning all of these awards we still had plenty of fun participating in Songfest, the Homecoming parade and numerous other campus activities.

Over the past year we have seen our chapter number increase to 97 men after a fall recruitment class of 33 men. We attribute this large class to the success of the Balanced Man Scholarship process. We were able to increase the scholarship amount awarded for the third year in a row and handed out more scholarships than in years past. We strongly believe that the effort and funds put into this scholarship help us secure the future of our chapter and we could not do this without your continued support of the program.
