he Ohio Iota Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon at the University of Toledo is riding a huge wave of recent success. At Conclave 2011, the brothers received their first Golden Buchanan Cup by winning their fifth Buchanan Cup in a row. The chapter has since refused to rest on their laurels. As fall semester went into full steam they took 1st place in the homecoming float competition. This spring they were the top group in the three categories of GPA, sports, and campus & community involvement. This "triple crown" is known as the Dean Parks Award at Toledo and no fraternity, sorority, or other organization has ever won all three in the same year.

In addition Ohio Iota had:

- a Ruck scholarship winner
- 5 brothers represented on the Homecoming Court

The chapter also leads the Greek system in manpower and has the best Greek fundraiser—Sig Ep Stromboli.



Anthony Strother II is going into his sophomore year and has quickly taken initiative in being a leader on campus, by taking on the responsibility of being next year's House Manager, and other positions in many organizations on campus. Nicholas Dorner is another young student leader on campus going into his sophomore year as well. Nicholas was one of the Balanced Man Scholarship winners last year, and it had such a positive impact on his first year going into college that he decided to return the next year and help run it. Both of these co-chairs are truly a testament to, and the best example of, what the Balanced Man Program really is and how useful the Scholarship program is for us in recruiting. Dozens of the current campus leaders have come from the Balanced Man Scholarship, and many have gone on to become the chapter president, different vice presidents within the chapter, and other top positions among the University including: Blue Key, Mortar Board National Honors Society, University Ambassadors, Student Government, and many others.

After the co-chairs reviewed and looked over applications from hundreds of incoming students, they were able to narrow it down to 75 semi-finalists. From here the

interviewers will take notes and will meet with the cochairs again to eventually pick about 10 finalists to be awarded different-size scholarship awards at the banquet at the end of the process.

All of these BMS finalists and semi-finalists are a great place to start for the upcoming fall recruitment season, as we in SigEp look to continue bringing in

At the start of the spring semester we held our first Undergraduate/Alumni Board Retreat at the Victorian Tudor Inn. After coming back from Carlson, Toledo held its bi annual Greek Recognition Night. Ohio Iota had

the fortune of finally winning what we like to call the "trifecta." This is first place in all Dean Parks categories: Scholarship, Sports, and Campus/Community Involvement. 
