

Chi Beta Chi was first organized on the University campus in the Spring of 1929. The goal of the fraternity was the development of culture, brotherhood, and character among university men. We were fortunate during the formative years and many years following, to have Dr. Charles Bushnell serve as

fraternity advisor. With his very capable help and guidance, we functioned most successfully during the lean years of the great depression. World War II desecrated the membership. It saw many of our group serving in the armed forces throughout the world. Chi Beta Chi survived and continued to grow in all these trying times. In 1951 Chi Beta Chi was installed as the Ohio lota Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon.

Our Alumni group is a shrinking organization membership wise. Time has taken its toll but we continue to function. Every other year the Chi Beta oldtimers hold a dinner dance — a real social gather-

ing that goes hand in hand with the University homecoming activities. In 1982 over 90 people were in attendance. ## Alumni Profile: Donald Petroff '61

"The Sig-Ep Chariot Races were one of the prime events in fraternity life on the UT campus. A soroity would sponsor a Sig-Ep and they (the sorority girls) would build a chariot in which to parade their Sig-Ep around. The sorority girls would be used as horses to pull a Sig-Ep chariot around in vicious competition. A great deal of the time the sorority with the most athletically inclined women would win the match taking home their Sig-Ep to victory."

This is one of the many memories of Brother Donald Petroff, '61, who was recently interviewed for the *Red Door's Alumni Profile*. Brother Don has been involved with and experienced Sigma Phi Epsilon in a wide spectrum. Pledging in his third year of collegiate life, Brother Don has seen the fraternity as a non-Greek, rushee, pledge, brother, and alumnus.

As a non-Greek Brother, Don led the traditional student life. He would go to class and then remove himself from campus, not actively

participating in extracurricular activities. Brother Don became friends with a few Sig-Ep's and later pledged. Once a brother, "my positive days started," Brother Don commented.

Playing an active role in Sig-Ep, Brother Don served his chapter as well as his university to his greatest potential. "I was Pledge Educator, House Manager, and Director of Ceremonies at all of the rush functions, probably what you today call rush chairman. I also played a role on the *Collegian* Staff as Business Manager of the paper."


"Sig-Ep played a major role in my college days. I had a wandering spirit for a couple of years and then I found contentment in Sig-Ep. It was sort of like a grave mistake that I didn't pledge my first year, but thank goodness I saw the light and pledged. When you were a Greek on the UT campus you were required to participate and be at all of the functions. This gave everyone the opportunity to expand and possibly later develop all of

their 'unknown' interests."


As an alumni, Brother Don has served us well. Sitting on the Householding Corporation, he was one of the select few that made our present house at 3530 Dorr Street a reality. As this happened I began to take an active role in meetings. Fraternity life is not phony; lessons are learned which can be valuable to you in the long run. When that happens you become one-sided and are therefore deficient in some degree."

"The most valuable thing I received from and put into Sig-Ep was the interaction with all of the fellow chapter members, how I dealt with them, and for what reason I came to that conclusion." They went down to defeat under a relentless attack from their fellow undergraduates. "Nice brothers," Tschantz said several times during the match.

Tschantz and Yee reached the semi's by edging alumni Barry Vanderkelen and Mike Willard. Vanderkelen said his playing was severly hindered. When asked what the problem was he said, "at the same time I was playing, I was doing the play by play commentary for the mixed doubles on the next court for WERC Sports."

In the mixed double competition Sue "Chris Evert" Moll and Jimmy "Connors" Irmen beat Dr. William Ruud and his lovely wife Judy. Moll likened Judy Ruud's play to that of Rosie Casals but said, "Bill played alot like Billie Jean King using her left hand." The hard fought match was the first mixed doubles ever played in the history of the alumni/active tennis tournament.
