1. We must meet the new and awe-inspiring economic challenges with which colleges across this country are faced. University of Toledo tuition and associated costs are at an all time high while the support from the state of Ohio has diminished. Student loans, grants, and scholarships have dried up and fraternity dues and other related costs which have historically been a reasonable part of student's budget now are out of reach for an increasing number of potential brothers. Also, fraternities, like any other business are faced with increased costs of operations.

2. We must ask ourselves if what we have done collectively up to now is good enough. Do we continue on the same path that we have followed? Though it has certainly served us well, the mind

does begin to dream: What does this chapter have the potential to accomplish? How good could it really be? Can this chapter take a place among the handful of elite fraternity chapters in this country? If so, how do we get there and what part will the alumni play? These are questions we must all ask ourselves and answer individually, as an alumni board, and as an active chapter. Two things we know with absolute certainty – we have an unbelievable pool of Ohio Iota alumni talent and we will need more alumni involvement of those talents if this chapter is to achieve its potential. Alumni Board Update

■his has been a very good year for the men of the Ohio Iota Residential Learning Community. Their goal has been to continue on the path toward their fifth Buchanan Cup in a row at the 2011 Conclave in Phoenix, Arizona in August. They have four consecutive Buchanan Cups since the chapter was reorganized in 2000. This win will be the gold cup signifying 10 straight years of being one of Sig Eps most outstanding chapters. There are very few chapters who have earned the gold Buchanan Cup.

These men continue the tradition of excellence on campus, in academics, and in intramural athletics and community service. They are the only fraternity to win/place in all categories in the Dean Parks Awards. This past fall they maintained a 3.236 GPA with a 102-man chapter, ranking number one on the campus for fraternities. They continue to dominate intramurals and won first place in the Dean Parks award for Athletics and placed 2nd in community service activities.

As alumni working with this chapter we hope that you know that Ohio Iota has more men serving on Sig Ep boards and as chapter counselors throughout the country than almost any other chapter. Interested? Just let us know and we will put you in contact with the people that can make it happen. You did not just join a fraternity for just your college years – it is a lifetime experience, and your service will be greatly appreciated.

The Ohio Iota Alumni Board has been very diligent in their efforts to work with the chapter officers to assist them in maintaining a quality presence on the UT campus. Ted Behnken has reported on the continuing increase in our investments over the last decade.

Scholarship donations are at an all-time high, and gifts from each spring's solicitation for alumni operations and chapter support continue at a steady pace. We now have four funds available to Ohio Iota Sig Eps. Our original scholarship fund assists with the Balanced Man Scholarship utilized in recruitment at the beginning of each year. The Mandula Family Fund is awarded annually to a brother within the chapter. The Richard and Gail Springer Fund is now available to assist with leadership opportunities for chapter members, and the new Dick and Kay Bensman Fund will be awarded to a Sig Ep who has graduated from the Toledo Public Schools.

The alumni work hand-inhand with the undergraduates to upgrade the D-1 facility in the McComas Village. This spring the university replaced the carpet in the first floor of our unit. Most of the furniture purchased in the last ten years is in fairly good shape and additional work has been done on the Man Room on the third floor and the Office in the basement. Additional plans will be to develop the Residential Learning Community space in the basement with the furnishing of the faculty fellow office and development of a conference room space.

It has been a great pleasure to see all of the alumni who have returned to the campus this year for the various Open Houses sponsored by the chapter, for Homecoming, or just to drop in to the house to see what is happening. The visits always seem to include looking at the composites which date back to the early '70s, which hang proudly on the walls of the house. One project now getting under way is the refurbishing of the many scrapbooks that have been done over the years. A new cabinet

to properly store them has been built in the Faculty Fellow office.

This year's senior alumni dinner saw over 120 alumni and undergrads at the Spaghetti Warehouse in downtown Toledo on April 28, 2011. Four alumni were honored for their contributions to the chapter and to the university community at that dinner. The Volunteer Excellence Award will be awarded to **Leslie Lipski** for his outstanding service to the chapter while leading the alumni board as the chapter moved from Winthrop Street to Dorr Street. The Career Achievement Award was awarded to Tim Harrington for his outstanding contributions and service as President of the Ability Center. His comments on making service a part of your life were outstanding. The Founder's Circle Award winners were Lawrence **Leake** and **Thomas Schnell**. Their comments about the early years of the chapter were well presented. It was a great evening of laughter and memories. Daniel Janisz was awarded the Mandula Scholarship this year. More and more alumni are attending this late April event each year. We have returned to the Thursday format at the request of many alumni who have attended.

Elections for alumni board members also took place at the dinner. All of the current board members were reelected and joining the board this next year will be Rick Stegman, Daniel Ferguson and Jarred Sigmon.

He was married June 15, 1957, to the former Beverly A. Kubitz. Jim worked more than 40 years for Key Bank, formerly Toledo Trust, retiring in December 1996. While working, he was active in, and was a past president, of his local chapter of the American Institute of Banking. In recent years he traveled extensively, visiting Ireland, Italy and England. He enjoyed Jazz music, flower gardening, watching woodland creatures in his backyard and attending live theater productions. He also enjoyed decorating his home with contemporary style, as if it would be photographed for an interior design magazine.

Surviving are his former wife and close friend, Beverly A. Rose of Toledo; son, David J. (Paula Wethington) Rose of Monroe, MI; daughter, Linda (Robert) Long of Woodstock, GA; 2 grandchildren, Bobby Long and Karolyn Wojtowicz; sister-in-law, Nancy Klawitter and many other extended family members. John M. "Jack" Vergiels, of Las Vegas, NV, died peacefully on December 16, 2009, surrounded by his family. He was born in Erie, Michigan in 1937. He grew up in Point Place and graduated from Waite High School. He was an all-star athlete in high school, and was named to the Waite Athletic Hall of Fame and was also a recipient of the Waite Distinguished Alumni Award. Jack attended the University of Toledo, where he earned his B.A., M.S. and Ph.D in Education. He played football and baseball for UT, and was a talented enough baseball player to try out for the Detroit Tigers. From 1960 to 1964, Jack was employed as a teacher and coach at Whitmer High School. From 1964 to 1966, he was Supervisor of Secondary Schools for the Sandusky County School District. From 1966 to 1968, he was Assistant Dean of Admissions at the University of Toledo. After obtaining his Doctorate degree he moved to Las Vegas and became professor of Education at UNLV. During his tenure, Dr. Vergiels served as Chairman of the UNLV Faculty Senate. In 1998, Dr. Vergiels was bestowed the title of Professor Emeritus. Jack went on to serve in the Nevada Legislature for 20 years. He was elected to the Nevada Assembly in 1972 and served there until 1984. While in the Assembly he was elected as Majority Whip in 1973, Assistant Majority Leader in 1979, Majority Floor Leader in 1981 and Assembly Speaker for the 1983 Session and the 1984 Special Session. Jack was elected to the Senate in 1984 and served until 1992. He was elected Senate Majority Leader for the 1991 Session, making him the only legislator in Nevada history to have served in the top leadership positions in both Houses. In 2007, he was inducted into the Nevada State Senate Hall of Fame. Following his legislative career, Jack became a lobbyist and consultant representing a wide variety of clients. He served on numerous boards of charitable organizations. He is survived by his loving wife, Halina; his children, Kelly (Greg) Arndt, of Lambertville, MI, Jack (Annabelle) and Robert Vergiels, of Las Vegas; as well as numerous grandchildren. A memorial service to celebrate Jack's life was held on Saturday, December 19, 2009. In lieu of flowers, contributions in his memory may be sent to the John M.
